The different groups brought food for tasting, allowing participants to share ingredients used to prepare food in the different cultures.

Praversh Gayparsad who was representing the Indian community tasted "Masonja" *Mopani Worms* for the first time in his life and described the taste as delightful.

"I did not know Masonja taste this good. I have always regarded them as worms, they are really delicious," said the impressed Gayparsad.
