He says: "As young people we have a role to play in the water sector. As a technically savvy generation, we should come up with innovative ways by using the technology we have at our disposal to better manage our water resources."

With an insatiable appetite for learning more, Katlego believes he still has more to learn, having just been with the Gauteng Provincial Office for only four months.

A person who is more at home working in the outdoors, Katlego places his love for the construction side of his career as his one true calling.

"I am a hands-on person and so naturally I am very much interested in the construction and I feel this is where I can make an indelible mark and being with the department will go a long way in moulding that person," says Katlego.
