DWS, Sunlight partners to save water

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Water Month is celebrated annually during the month of March. This year Water Week falls on 18 – 24 March and is celebrated under the theme "Access to safe water by 2030 – Possible through nature".

The Western Cape is still experiencing a crippling drought that has seen dam levels delve below desired levels and forcing the communities to adapt in a way they have not done before. The reality of standing in long queues to receive water seeped into their lives at an alarming rapid rate.

The drought has made more and more people appreciate the importance of water. Even though some dam levels throughout the Free State has shown great improvement this does not mean that as a country we are out of the woods yet. Some of the dams such as Groothoek Dam which supplies Thaba Nchu do not supply as the levels have reached a perilous stage and there are many other dams that are below 20% in the Free State Province.

Responsibility for water conservation still falls on all who use and consume it regardless of water restrictions in place or not.

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
