Observing World Toilet Day by encouraging learners to keep toilets clean for the health of the nation

The Department of Water and Sanitation (DWS) joined the world in observing World Toilet Day by joining learners at Likhweti Primary School in Kanyamazane in the City of Mbombela. You are lucky here to have flushing toilets so take care of them and keep them clean at all times, as billions of people in the world do not have access to proper toilet facilities. A toilet is one of the most important places that is normally taken for granted. We all take note of the importance of a toilet when nature calls and we are pressed to relieve ourselves. We have brought some toilet cleaning brushes to ensure that you keep the toilets clean and hygiene to prevent the spread of germs and diseases, so use the brushes correctly to ensure clean and safe toilets for the use by all. Also remember to wash your hands after using the toilet and before touching food", he stated.

The learners were also encouraged to promote water conservation in their homes and educated their parents, family members and friends of the importance of saving water in our water scarce country and the washing of hands to prevent the spread of diseases such as diarrhea and cholera.



The school principal, Mr DB Kubheka thanked the Department for the awareness and the material provided and encouraged the learners to always use the toilets in a proper manner and always leave them in a state they would like to find them, especially when they are pressed to relieve themselves.
