Eastern Cape dam levels record minimal decrease, residents urged to use water sparingly

Recent rainfall in parts of the Eastern Cape has brought some relief, though overall dam levels across the province have shown a slight decrease. A weekly dam levels report issued earlier this week by the Department of Water and Sanitation (DWS) shows that provincial storage is currently at 82.6%, down from 83.2% last week. While this indicates some fluctuation, most major dams remain relatively stable, and water resource monitoring continues.

Kouga Dam, which plays a critical role in supplying the Nelson Mandela Bay Metro, has shown a marginal increase from 78.6% to 79.2%. Nqweba Dam in Graaff-Reinet also experienced a slight improvement, rising from 91.2% to 91.8%. In contrast, Impofu Dam has decreased from 51.3% to 51.0%, showing no signs of significant recovery.

In the Amathole Water Supply System, Nahoon Dam dropped from 100.1% to 99.9%, while Laing Dam saw a small decrease from 101.2% to 100.9%. Bridle Drift Dam remains at full capacity, recording a level of 104.1% this week.

Further east, the Umtata Dam remains stable at 100.6%, with Mabeleni Dam unchanged at 100.0%. Ntenetyana Dam saw a slight decline from 103.6% to 102.8%.

The Klipplaat Water Supply System continues to show strength and unchanged at last week's 100.3%. Macubeni Dam holds steady at 98.5%, Xonxa Dam remains at 99.9%, Waterdown Dam stays at 100.6%, and Tsojana Dam continues to perform well at 99.7%.

The Department urges all residents to continue using water wisely and sparingly. Communities are also encouraged to report any water infrastructure vandalism or water leaks to their nearest authorities.
