Kwena Dam stable at 100.9% as most Lowveld dams continue to record improvements in water levels

the Kwena Dam, located on the Crocodile River upstream of the City of Mbombela in the Lowveld and Ehlanzeni District of Mpumalanga Province is stable and above the 100% mark.

According to the latest weekly state of reservoirs report from the Department of Water and Sanitation (DWS), the Kwena Dam remains unchanged from the 100.9% recorded last week. The other listed dams which remained unchanged is the Da Gama Dam at 100.3%.

The majority of listed dams in the Lowveld and Ehlanzeni District recorded improvements in water levels. Driekoppies Dam increased from 92.0% to 92.4%, Longmere Dam from 100.9% to 101.3%, Klipkopjes Dam from 100.0% to 100.4%, Witklip Dam from 100.4% to 100.8%, Primkop Dam from 100.2% to 100.9%, Inyaka Dam from 94.3% to 94.9%, and Ohrigstad Dam from 65.8% to 67.6%.

Meanwhile, Blyderivierpoort and Buffelskloof dams recorded slight declines even though they are still above 100%, dropping from 100,7% to 100.6%, respectively.

The weekly dam status report also highlights a continued rise in water levels across the Mpumalanga Province, largely due to persistent rainfall. Average dam levels across the province have increased from 99.4% to 99.9%. In the Water Management Areas (WMA), the Limpopo-Olifants WMA increased from 95.6% to 96.4%, while the Inkomati-Usuthu WMA saw an increase from 98.0% to 98.7%.

All the three districts of the Mpumalanga Province also recorded improvements in water levels, with Ehlanzeni increasing from 95.4% to 95.8%, Gert Sibande from 100.5% to 101.3%, and Nkangala from 101.2% to 101.5%.

While water levels remain satisfactory, the Department of Water and Sanitation urges all citizens to use water responsibly. South Africa remains a water-scarce country, and conservation efforts are crucial. The public is encouraged to use water wisely, report leaks promptly and take proactive steps to minimize water loss.
