


- Water Issues

WFGD

- Dams
- Licence applications (document raises the hampering effect)
 - 800 ha (2004)
 - 5 500 ha (2007)
 - 30 000 ha (2008 EC alone)
- Sec 4.8
 - Lowest value (plan to revalue)
 - Entire value chain (in document)
 - Fourth highest Forex earner
 - Almost zero water management costs

WFGD

- Implementation of water tariffs enacted in accordance with the law and other agreements
- Finalisation and implementation of the waste discharge charge system
- Forestry as the only streamflow reduction activity (been finalised but results highly questionable)
- Retention of existing skilled staff within the Department
- Consider water neutral industries
