JvR stated that the allocations would always be reviewed and adjusted as required during a drought cycle.</li> <li>System performance.</li> <li>EL presented a report highlighting the following:         <ul> <li>Storage levels in SA (total) and the local WMA since 1980 and highlighted the sequence of wet and dry cycles, the steep drop in storage levels at the outset of a drought and the high likelihood of a dry cycle is the short-to medium-term.</li> <li>The Amatole System was 99.6% full as at 19 March 2012;</li> <li>The System is in a stable condition and restrictions are unlikely in the short to medium term.</li> <li>That storage in the Amatole System is tracking the 25% curve, i.e. we are currently in a</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
